From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Parishioners:

It can happen that when we become too close to things or all too familiar with things, they may lose their value or importance in our lives. I think this could be the case with the parable of the *Good Samaritan* that we hear today. Despite our familiarity with this story of our Lord, we really do need to hear it again and again. It is more than just an admonition to be *nice to strangers*. It is an instruction on how to live the great commandment by identifying our neighbor with the person we would easily ignore.

Last week, on my annual retreat, the director, made a simple but powerful observation: "We are all capable of writing off people." Isn't this part of Our Lord's parable? Each person who passed by the robber's victim each had their own "reason" for writing off their obligation to care for this suffering neighbor. In our relationships how often we take on the same attitude. Perhaps Fr. Henri Nouwen's reflection is helpful to us in this regard:

We are not sent to the world to judge, condemn, to evaluate, to classify, or to label. When we walk around as if we have to make up our minds about people and tell them what is wrong with them and how they should change, we only create more division. Jesus says it clearly: "Be compassionate just as your Father is compassionate. Do not judge...do not condemn...forgive." (Luke 6: 36-37) In a world that constantly asks us to make up our minds about people, a nonjudgmental presence seems nearly impossible. But it is one of the most beautiful fruits of a deep spiritual life and will be easily recognized by others.

Enjoy these summer days!

How often should adoration of the exposed Blessed Sacrament occur?

"It is recommended that in . . . churches and oratories [where the Eucharist is regularly reserved] an annual solemn exposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament be held for an appropriate period of time, even if not continuous, so that the local community more profoundly meditates on and adores the eucharistic mystery." Thus, every pastor should arrange annually for solemn exposition and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

Getting Ready for the New Roman Missal Who is doing the work of translation?

The process of translating liturgical texts from the original Latin is a highly consultative work done by several groups. The International Commission on English in the Liturgy (ICEL) prepares English translations of liturgical texts on behalf of the Conferences of bishops of English-speaking countries. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) and other member conferences receive draft translations of each text and have the opportunity to offer comments and suggestions to ICEL. Then ICEL proposes a second draft, which each Conference approves and submits to the Vatican for final approval. Each Conference reserves the right to amend or modify a particular text.

At the Vatican, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments examines the translated texts, offers authoritative approval (*recognitio*) of the texts, and grants permission for their use. The translation and review process is guided by the guidelines in *Liturgiam Authenticam*, issued in 2001, an instruction from the Congregation that outlines the principles and rules for liturgical translation. In 2007, the Congregation also issued a *ratio* outlining the specific rules for translation in English.

Clothes say something about what we think, what we value. They also influence how we behave and feel. That our culture has become so casual about everything says something about us. I cannot exactly articulate it but it seems to say, "Nothing is really all that important." But that is not true. Going to God's house IS important. Being ministered to by the King of Kings and Lord of Lords is astounding. Casual attire in these circumstances is simply inappropriate if we really think about what we are doing, where we are going, and who it is we will meet. It does not necessarily follow that we must wear tuxedos and formal gowns. But decent semi-formal attire seems wholly appropriate. Sunday is special; God's House is special. Some things really ARE important and our clothing and demeanor ought to reflect this truth.

The reflection above is worth noting as we come to summer. Think about Msgr. Pope's observations. I happen to agree with him and ask that we give a little more thought to how we dress for worship. I would not want to get involved in describing a dress code, but I think that we should, at the very least avoid attire that is intended for the beach or gym! Indeed everyone is always welcome into the Lord's house, yet his disciples should provide a witness that being there is something awesome...indeed extraordinary!

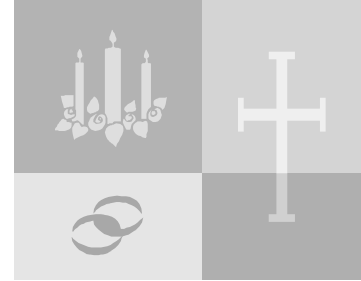

Knights News

The National Organization for Marriage (NOM) has launched its *Summer for Marriage Tour 2010*. NOM is taking the message for marriage directly to the American people and building support for marriage all across the eastern half of the United States. NOM rendered invaluable support to us in New Jersey in our successful effort to defeat the legislative effort to impose same-sex marriage on our state.

In 33 days, they'll travel more than 6,000 miles, holding rallies in 23 cities from Maine to Minnesota to Atlanta and Tampa before heading back to Washington, DC, for the tour finale on August 15.

Many of the states they'll be visiting are key battlegrounds in this critical debate, as they work to organize grassroots support for marriage as the union of a husband and wife at both the state and federal levels. Their goal is to build support for state marriage amendments and opposition to the repeal of the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA).

On July 20 they will be at the Statehouse in Trenton, holding a marriage rally from noon until 1:00 p.m. The Knights of Columbus joins the New Jersey Catholic Conference is supporting this rally and invites all to attend. One of our bishops will be speaking at the rally. He deserves the presence and support of all who are able to attend.
