I am certain that we shall receive there much of the information, indeed the tools, we need to help our parishioners through this transition. Take a few minutes to read Bishop Serratelli's article. It provides a good foundation to our understanding of what we shall all experience together soon!

#### Next Weekend -- August 14-15

Next weekend, the Mass texts of the 20<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time "defer" to those of the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This festival goes back to the fifth century in Jerusalem when a feast of Mary's "Dormition" was celebrated at a Basilica in Gethsemane. The term "Assumption" appeared around the year 770. Sixty years ago, Pope Pius XII solemnly defined as an article of faith, the centuries-old belief that at the end of her earthly life, the Virgin Mary was taken up to heaven, body and soul. Mary Assumed in Heaven is the patroness of the Diocese of Trenton.

### Eucharistic Adoration

**How is the Blessed Sacrament revered? How is the reverence different when the Blessed Sacrament is exposed?**

What distinguishes the reverence given to the exposed Sacrament from adoration before the tabernacle is the communal nature of reverence to the exposed Sacrament. In Eucharistic exposition, the Blessed Sacrament is revered by the common prayer of the people in silence, song, and meditation, by incensation, and by other liturgical acts, including genuflection. "A single genuflection is made in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, whether reserved in the tabernacle or exposed for public adoration."

### Getting Ready for the New Roman Missal

#### What will the new Missal mean in my parish?

In the months before the revised translation is implemented, parishes will have to do many things. The parish will have to replace liturgical books and participation aids. Priests will practice by proclaiming the new texts and will prepare homilies helping the faithful to understand the new translation and to deepen their appreciation for the Liturgy. The music ministers and the people will learn new musical settings of the parts of the mass (such as the *Gloria* and the *Sanctus*). Catechists and teachers will help the parishioners learn the new prayers. Parishes may also use this opportunity to undertake a thorough re-examination of their liturgical practices.

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## Welcoming the Roman Missal

### Part I

To change indicates that one is alive. This applies to people, institutions and even language. It is a natural development even when it meets resistance, because we can become comfortable in old and familiar ways. The challenge of change is before English-speaking Catholics now as the church prepares for the most significant change in the liturgy since the introduction of the new Order of Mass in 1970. Many have asked questions, expressed concerns, or simply wondered about the reasons for the new translation and the goals of its implementation.

#### Why a New Text?

The *Missale Romanum* (Roman Missal), the ritual text for the celebration of the Mass, is first introduced in Latin by Pope John Paul II in 2000 as the *editio typica* (“typical edition”). It became the official text to be used in the celebration of the Mass, and conferences of Bishops had to begin the work of preparing vernacular translations. It contains...new prayers for the... feasts/memorials of recently canonized saints, additional prefaces for the Eucharistic Prayers, additional Masses and Prayers for Various Needs and Intentions, as well as some modifications of rubrics (instructions) for the celebration of Mass. To aid the process of translation of the Missal...the Holy See issued *Liturgiam Authenticam* in 2001...which outlines the principles and rules for translation. These principles have evolved and been nuanced...and now govern the work which has resulted in a fresh English translation of the Roman Missal.

#### The Translation

Liturgical language is important for the life of the church. The well-known axiom *Lex orandi, lex credendi*, reminds us that what we pray is not only the expression of our sentiment and our reverence toward God, but what we pray also expresses the faith of the church. Our words in the liturgy are not simply expressions of one individual in one particular place at one time in history. Rather, they pass on the faith from one generation to the next. For this reason, we bishops take seriously our responsibility to provide translations of liturgical texts that are accurate and inspiring. Hence there is sometimes rather passionate discussion of words, syntax and phrases. The new translation provides us with prayers that are theologically accurate, in a language with dignity and beauty that can be understood, as called for in *Liturgiam Authenticam*.

The translations should be characterized by a kind of language which is easily understandable, yet which at the same time preserves these texts' dignity, beauty, and doctrinal precision. By means of words of praise and adoration that foster reverence and gratitude in the face of God's majesty, his power, his mercy and his transcendent nature, the translations will respond to the hunger and thirst for the living God that is experienced by the people of our own time, while contributing also to the dignity and beauty of the liturgical celebration itself.

The process of translation of the new edition of the Roman Missal has involved linguistic, biblical, and liturgical scholars from each of the eleven English-speaking countries which ICEL (International Commission on English in the Liturgy) serves because this text will be used by the church throughout the English-speaking world. It is important for us to remember that we Americans are but one part of a larger English-speaking community.

Even the best of all possible translations will not suit every individual's preference. No translation will be perfect. Proponents of the new text sometimes argue, perhaps unfairly, that the texts currently in use in our liturgy (in the present *Sacramentary*), the product of great efforts by translators from 1969 to 1973, are marked by a style of English that is flat and uninspiring. That text, however, has served the church in the English-speaking world well for more than thirty years, and has enabled us to take great strides in working toward the Council's goal of "full, conscious, and active participation" in the liturgy. We should be careful not judge too hastily what has been the language of our worship. Our present texts are familiar and comfortable.

Those who have already been critical of the new text, often without having seen more than a few examples out of context, express concern about unfamiliar vocabulary and unnecessarily complicated sentence structures. Having been involved in the work of translation, I can attest that the new translation is good and worthy of our use. It is not perfect, but perfection will come only when the liturgy on earth gives way to that of heaven, where all the saints praise God with one voice.

### Where We Go From Here

We humans are creatures of habit. We Catholics are creatures of ritual. Ritual is based on the familiar—on patterns that have been learned. A liturgical assembly can fully, consciously, and actively participate in the liturgy because the members of the assembly (priest and people) know what they are doing. Any change in the rituals will affect how we participate. It is natural to resist such changes simply to remain grounded in the familiar because it is comfortable. It should be said at the outset that the new text of the Roman Missal represents a change in the language, but not in the ritual. There have been only a few minor adjustments to the rubrics of the Order of Mass, and most of them represent changes that were already in effect through other liturgical books, such as the Ceremonial of Bishops, that had not been incorporated into the printed text of the Missal. So how do we prepare ourselves to use the new text? We bishops have called for an extensive process of catechesis leading to the implementation of the text.
